EAA CHAPTER 91 MINUTES OF THE MEETING March 19, 2018

The meeting of EAA Chapter 91 was called to order by President Mike Dooley at 7:00 P.M. in the chapter meeting room at Lee's Summit Airport. The Pledge of Allegiance was led by Bob Bond. Greetings were extended to members and guests. Guests were introduced including Barry Crispin from Merriam, Tony Monetti, and Rod Prall were introduced.

Announcements included news Bill Herrold was in a care center in Bonner Springs with mailing information on the bulletin board. Chapter calendars and Missouri Airport Directories were available.

Treasurer, Phil Ishmael was absent but planned to present a first quarter financial report at the next meeting. The minutes of the February 17, 2018 were approved as printed in the March newsletter. Members were reminded to get 2018 membership dues to Phil Ishmael along with an updated application if any changes in their data had changed. An IMC meeting was scheduled April 9 and an aircraft electrical workshop March 24. The first pancake breakfast/Young Eagles rally would be April 21. The EAA's Ford Tri-motor would be hosted by the chapter May 31 to June 4. The tour-stop coordinator was Wayne Moore with Phil Ishmael marketing coordinator. A sign-up sheet was available. Volunteers were needed Saturday, March 24, 9:30 A.M. to examine all chairs and repair as needed. A Cajun Cookout potluck was scheduled Friday, March 23 at 5:30 with a sign-up sheet provided.

Lastly, Tony Monetti, former bomber pilot, made brief comments about his time flying B-52s, B-1, and B-2 bombers. He would be scheduled as an evening program in the near future.

THE POSTER



We've all seen it. It's nicely framed and hangs on the south wall just inside the meeting room close to the office door. It tells a great story, but one we may not really know. So President Emeritus Larry Young took a few minutes at our March gathering to explain it.

On April 18, 1942, Jimmy Doolittle led the famous raid on Japan with sixteen B-25s launched from the aircraft carrier Hornet some 600 miles from the Japanese mainland. It was retaliation for the dastardly Pearl Harbor attack and proof America was not afraid. But that story is famous. The lesser known one occurred in 1995 when sixty WW-II survivors gathered in Kansas City's Union Station for the 50th anniversary of the victory in Europe. Among them were pilots and crew members who participated in the Doolittle Raid. Larry met and mingled with them, even joining in singing the Air Force song. Several participants signed the poster, including Travis Hunter, pilot of the second B-25 to launch. Chapter member Pierre D'Etremont had it framed and presented it to the chapter. So next time you're in the clubhouse, look at it again, but just a little closer this time.

MARCH'S PROGRAM - A VIKING TALE







When Fred Schieszer tells a story, you always learn something. He makes even difficult technicalities come alive. I'm not sure how, but maybe forty years teaching college students offers a hint. Whatever his secret, Chapter 91 members learn from Fred. Our last program is a perfect example. As an accident investigator, Fred had discovered a pernicious problem with Bellanca Viking and Super Viking airplanes. Apparently a design weakness cause super-hot engine temperatures to affect certain electrical cables. The fix was to reroute the cables to the other side of the airplane, but mechanics found it faster to use a different solution. And that solution unwittingly compounded the problem. Ultimately, an AD was issued, but not everyone followed the protocol.

When a Bellanca on a charter flight from Illinois experienced electrical problems, the pilot (CFI/A&P with IA) failed to make the proper repairs. After the engine quit in marginal VFR conditions, the plane stalled some three hundred feet in the air and short of the runway at Booneville, Missouri, killing the pilot and injuring the three passengers. Investigators discovered Fred's diagnosis was the answer.

Can you trust your mechanic? Well, "trust but verify" is still sound advice. We can locate ADs for any aircraft and determine the status of compliance. But in this case, the pilot was the mechanic, and he made the wrong fix.

Thanks, Fred. Your insights make a powerful impact.

It's really great to have access to this kind of talent, and we thank John Faulkenberry for his assistance. May the best team win!


A ROAD CONSTRUCTION NOTE
