As discussed after his presentation, Paul's new book "Shuttle, Houston: My Life in the Center Seat of Mission Control" has just been released (and is available from all of the usual book sources). - You ask me to hand-carry the book to my next face-to-face meeting with Paul as part of the Homebuilt Aircraft Council. We may be able to meet in November, but it's possible that the meeting won't happen until next April, depending on COVID-19 rules in Wisconsin.

I know we all missed AirVenture this past month, but I thought EAA did an outstanding job providing multiple "channels" of online content July 21-25 as part of "Spirit of Aviation Week." Webinars, homebuilding demonstrations, etc. were available on a wide variety of topics. I "attended" several webinars and they were excellent. Many of the presentations are now available on the EAA website.

Our contribution to "Spirit of Aviation Week" was a "hybrid" Flying Start program on Saturday, July 25. The program brought prospective pilots together with flying schools, clubs, etc. at our Eagle Hangar and online using GoToMeeting. A total of 12 participants (9 in-person and 3 online) were able to join us and we're now in the process of linking them up with pilots for their "Eagle Flights." We're still in Eastern Jackson County Recovery Plan, Phase 2.5. Although Phase 2.5 allows larger gatherings, it includes a face mask order that requires masks to be worn whenever social distancing cannot be maintained. As part of our own COVID-19 recovery plan we will host a mix of online and "hybrid" (online and face-to-face) gatherings in August:

OUR LATEST FLYING START PROGRAM

On Saturday, July 25, Chapter 91, under the able guidance of Griff Pickett, held our second Flying Start program. After a couple of false starts, thanks to that pesky Covid critter, Griff was finally able to pull it off. Flying Start is designed to inform potential pilots about how to learn to fly.

Griff said it was the first time Flying Start was presented in a hybrid format – both online and in person. Mike Dooley set up all the electronics and made sure everything would work for the four hour session. He was also one of the presenters.

Nine people attended in person, while three others joined online. Kansas State University gave an online presentation, Rebel Aviation was present locally and talked about their instruction program and block time purchase plan. Air Associates was also present.

In addition to Mike, the presenters were Jeanné Willerth, John Ford, Mitch Putnam, and Phil Ishmael. Jeanné spoke as an instructor, and the others discussed additional aspects, including how they learned to fly. At the end of the program, the attendees were invited to schedule Eagle Flights with local pilots. As of the last report, four had done so with the rest pending.

Since several others wanted to attend but were unable to do so, Griff is planning to form an abbreviated "second chance" session to accommodate them. We'll keep you posted.

Interestingly enough, other EAA chapters contacted us asking for details on how to hold a similar program. The hybrid aspect is not simple, so Mike wrote an article which EAA may present in a *ChapterGram*, an internal publication.

Our hats are off to Griff and all who helped put this outstanding program together. From what we've heard, it was extremely well received and a few have already scheduled instruction for the near future. We have it on good authority that Oshkosh was thrilled with what Chapter 91 did. Way to go

CHAPTER ELECTIONS FOR 2020

CHAPTER 91'S TOOL CRIB

Were you aware that Chapter 91 had a tool crib? Many did not, so Mike decided to let the cat out of the bag. If you're building a project, sometimes a tool is needed for just one job or for a small period of time. So your membership includes allowing you to borrow and use these tools as you need them. In our efforts to keep everyone more fully informed, the following is presented for your edification.

Introduction

EAA Chapter 91 has invested in a selection of precision tools for the exclusive benefit of our members as they build and maintain their aircraft. Additional tools have been generously donated by chapter members.

A detailed listing of tools will be available in the members-only part of our chapter website. A few simple rules will allow us to get the most benefit for our members while protecting the chapter's interest in these valuable assets.

Basic Policy

- EAA Chapter 91 tool crib tools are intended for the exclusive use of EAA Chapter 91 members for use on personally owned Experimental or Certificated aircraft.
- The EAA Chapter 91 tool crib cabinet will be locked except during tool issue/turnin. Keys will be held by technical counselors and the chapter president.
- EAA Chapter 91 tools are not to be used in any commercial context. Specifically, they shall not be loaned, shared, or rented to non-members, nor may they be used by members to provide a commercial service to non-members.
- EAA Chapter 91 tools (except "high end" tools) shall always remain the personal responsibility of the borrowing Chapter 91 member, including transit from the Eagle Hangar to the aircraft location and back. Except for normal wear and tear or product malfunction, replacement or repair following loss or damage shall be the responsibility of the borrowing member.
- Technical counselors will answer members' questions or provide assistance in the use of any Chapter 91 owned tools.

High End Tool Policy

- Members requiring the loan of high end tools listed in this paragraph will request a chaperone from a Technical Counselor.
- The chaperone will be trained in the proper care and use of the tool(s). He/she will accompany the tool and oversee its usage, ensuring the member learns the proper use and care of the tool(s).

Notice of Construction

Beginning Monday August 10th pavement rehabilitation work will be underway for Taxi lanes Alpha and Bravo.

These are the two asphalt taxi lanes that serve the T-hangar units. A contractor will begin work on the two asphalt hangar taxi lanes starting at 7:00am each day. This work is expected to be conducted over a four-day period, weather permitting. The work will involve milling and overlaying one taxi lane at a time. The easterly taxi lane will be milled on Monday with an asphalt overlay on Tuesday. The second taxi lane will be milled on Wednesday and overlaid on Thursday. Included in this work will be milling and overlaying approximately 10-feet of the south apron area that joins these two taxi lanes. *See attached diagram.*

We ask that during the time the milling and overlaying is underway you please don't try to access the hangars via the grass or taxi lane as you might damage the edges of the milled areas on the taxi lane or drives that are mill as well as your vehicle.

The remarking of the taxi lane and approach drives will be performed sometime after the asphalt work is complete. Notice will be given by email once we have a date for this work.

Thank you and we appreciate your patience and understanding allowing us to keep the facilities at your airport in good shape.
