Young Eagle Coordinator Chris St. Germain said despite some inclement weather, it had been a good year for Chapter 91 Young Eagles. He reminded pilots there were still a few weeks left in which they could introduce youth to the program before the new year.

LAST MONTH'S PROGRAM – HOWARD SCHNEEBERGER







Following our delicious chili dinner, Chapter 91 member Howard Schneeberger took us on a brief walk through the new aerospace curriculum at St. Michael the Archangel High School. Coupled with our obvious interest in such a cutting edge program, Chapter 91 has also partnered with the school to provide various levels of support including gradually bringing various students on our Young Eagles flights. While the presentation was refreshingly brief, there was no doubt about Howard's enthusiasm for the program.

AOPA developed the curriculum which includes knowledge for passing a private pilot's license written test by the senior year and/or a drone pilot certificate. Only twenty-nine schools in the United States have this program so far, but more are joining thanks to Howard's pioneering efforts to prove its efficacy at St. Michael's.

Howard displayed and explained several items made by the aviation students, including a helmet which he had signed by our own lady astronaut, Sarah Ratley.

During his talk, Howard recognized Hayden White, son of Chapter 91 member Kyle White, who is enrolled at St. Michael the Archangel. Hayden distinguished himself earlier this summer by soloing a J-3 Cub, which probably makes him the first in the aerospace program to do so. Plus, since the Cub is a taildragger, that puts Hayden well ahead of the pack in flying skills! Impressive, especially at such a young age.

Howard has a strong background for his position since after graduating from Notre Dame, where he participated in ROTC, he spent six years in the air force flying C-130s. After leaving the service, he flew for TWA and its progression of acquirers, where he flew 727s, L-1022s, and 747s. Interestingly, he commented that he had never flown a small airplane. He retired from the airlines in 2000 and was recruited by St. Michael's after hearing about its ambitious plan to institute the aerospace program.

Our thanks to Howard for keeping us abreast of a wonderful course for high school students. It's clear that curriculum is in very able hands.

JANUARY'S PROGRAM

Several of Chapter 91's members are in various stages of building their own airplanes. Some of them are going to encounter areas where they will have questions, the answers to which will have a somber impact on airworthiness or could even cause hiccups when certification time comes around. New builders may not know that many of those issues can be addressed and answered with the help of a technical counselor. And we just happen to have one of those. He is longtime chapter- and board member Mark Burrow. Mark's background more than gualifies him to fill this position, and he has frequently assisted numerous builders, helping guide them through what could be tricky traps and difficulties. Mark's services as a TC are completely free, and we wanted to remind everyone that this kind of help is available. So we asked Mark to speak at our next gathering, where he will provide more details on how builders can tap into his expertise. Mark will speak immediately after the business meeting, coffee break, and 50/50 drawing which all starts at 7:00 p.m. Monday, January 21 at the Larry Young Eagle Hangar. If you know anyone showing interest in building, bring them along because this may be the perfect time to learn where to find help.

EAA CHILD PROTECTION PROGRAM

Anyone who interfaces with youth via Chapter 91 must have certification to participate. Those who received these credentials two years ago must recertify again. Go to <u>https://www.eaa.org/eaa/youth/free-ye-flights/ye-volunteers/</u> then click on "Youth Protection and Program." EAA pays for the background check and no Social Security Number is required. So check out the details, then get or renew your certification today. Then you'll be ready for our Young Eagles in April.

JIM RAY FOUNDATION SCHOLARSHIPS UPDATE

By now, you probably know the Jim Ray Foundation is graciously providing EAA \$1,000,000 in scholarship money for select students to earn an FAA pilot's license. This is a once-in-a-lifetime opportunity for some deserving young people to achieve their dreams of flight. Mike has detailed the basic points in his <u>President's Corner</u> column, so review them as needed.

To update the current status, in January, EAA will post the final details and from there, select which chapters may appoint candidates to receive the money. This is not a slam-dunk: Chapter 91 has no guarantees of being chosen, but with our history and status with EAA, we feel confident we have a good chance at being allowed to participate.

Jim Brady and Griff Pickett will head up our program, so we're ready to go. But if we become one of the lucky chapters, we must guarantee our participant or participants will complete the flight training successfully within one year. That's a big order. There are age restrictions and the unavoidable loopholes Jim and Griff will have to navigate, but based on our knowledge from the Young Eagles program, our candidate(s) should have the highest chance of succeeding.

But our timeline is short, and tight. Once we receive the final qualification details, the chapter must first be chosen. Then, assuming we are, we must carefully select our candidate(s) and vet them to insure they will succeed. Actually, this is pretty exciting, and we hope you will continue to support our efforts to assist local young people with such an impressive and amazing opportunity. You will receive further details as we learn them. But keep your fingers crossed, okay?

THE 42ND AIR RACE CLASSIC

The 42nd Air Race Classic (formerly known as the Powder Puff Derby) will include KLXT as a stop and checkpoint this summer. Begun in 1929 when twenty women pilots flew from Santa Monica, California to Cleveland, Ohio. Many colorful participants have participated including Amelia Earhardt, Pancho Barnes, and Blanche Noyes. While stopped during WW-II, the race picked up again in 1946 and has continued ever since. This year, the race begins in Jackson, Tennessee and flies a twitchy, clockwise route to LaGrange, Georgia, Hattiesburg, Mississippi, and Bryant, Arkansas before reaching Lee's Summit. It continues on through Canada before reaching the finish line in Welland, Ontario, and will cover 2,216 nautical miles. We will provide more information as it develops and Chapter 91 may assist in some parts of the event. Stay in touch for updates.
