LAST MONTH'S PROGRAM



Winter Flying – The “Hidden Files”...

Some lessons from the (very) far north...



Since it's now officially winter, a timely discussion of winter flying was in order. Thanks to the experience and presentation skills of Mike Dooley and John Ford, we were reminded of some of the cautions involved in winter flying.

Since we don't live in the tropics (even though that's debatable June through August) it's worthwhile to focus on some of the things we don't usually think about. For example, the reminder that CO₂ detectors are very cheap, and can save lives. Or that when the temperature drops below 32 degrees, preheating becomes highly important. Mike showed a picture of the preheat system he uses on his RV and reminded us that most FBOs have heat carts available when temperatures dip. Since metal props dissipate heat quickly, keeping them covered in the winter makes a lot of sense.

Avionics and autopilots are sensitive to cold and need warmth, too. Mike then discussed the effects of frostbite and how survival gear and clothing could prove invaluable. He suggested everyone should have a survival kit capable of maintaining two people for up to 72 hours and offered to help one at no charge.

Then, John Ford spoke about some of his personal recollections of winter flying. John has a great deal of experience in that area, having come from the Great Frozen North. In fact, he reported his personal chill record was -65 – obviously, not for the faint of heart. One particularly interesting story involved an engine change on an L-19 Birdog which took place outside in below 30 degree temperatures. Once the job was completed and the engine was started, it ran for only ten minutes before destroying itself. The cause? No preheat. The cylinders and pistons expanded at different rates, so preheating proved critical.

John also described ways to handle super cold engines including draining the oil, warming it, and putting it back in prior to start. Another involved an “oil dilute” button which actually injected raw fuel into the engine, effectively thinning the oil viscosity enough to make starting and running easier. That was a new one for me. Live and learn, right?

The presentation proved interesting and stimulated some critical thinking. Thanks, guys.

THIS MONTH'S PROGRAM

This month's program will feature Fred Stadler from Chapter 252. Fred's mini-bio includes:

- Volunteer pilot at EAA's Pioneer Airport in Oshkosh, Wisconsin since 2000, where he flies EAA Museum visitors in vintage, open-cockpit biplanes. (Yeah, it's tough, but somebody has to do it.)
- Young Eagle pilot with over 8,000 Young Eagle flights (yes, you read that right-eight thousand).
- EAA AirVenture Notice to Airmen (NOTAM) Chairman and Flight Line Operations Co-chairman
- CFI, A&P-IA
- Owned a 1956 Cessna 310 for 49 years
- Currently flies a GlaStar

As noted above, Fred's "day job" is flying passengers in vintage planes at EAA's Pioneer Airport. In researching the history of one of the biplanes, Fred discovered it had been owned by pioneer aviator Bob Shank.

Fred has put together a great presentation about Bob and early aviation in the US, complete with photos provided by Bob's family as well as audio recordings of Bob's voice from an interview conducted in the 1950's. Please join us on January 18 for the amazing story of "**Bob Shank, Pioneer Pilot**" and the airplanes he flew!

JANUARY'S GATHERING INVITATION

When it's meeting time, just click on <https://global.gotomeeting.com/join/311463669> and you'll be connected with both visual and audio. (That assumes you have a web cam, of course, but they're cheap to buy if you have an older PC; otherwise, it's probably already sitting there looking at you.)

Now, if you don't have a PC, tablet, or smart phone, you may still gain remote access using your regular telephone. In that case, you won't have the video feed, but you will be able to hear just fine. To dial in, call 1 872 240-3212 and when asked, enter the access code of 311-463-669. That's all there is to it.

While we start at 7p.m., Mike is always in-house by 6:30, so you can join up a bit earlier for a virtual visit with anyone else who's there.

We realize all this isn't ideal, and everyone would much prefer to just show up at KLXT to meet with our like-minded cohorts. However, we are doing something that many organizations are not doing – meeting! Period! Lots of other groups have literally folded for lack of innovative problem solving. BARNSTORMING MUSEUM RAFFLE ANNOUNCED

Dear Mr. Dooley,

I'm reaching out to EAA chapter presidents in the hope that you might help us spread the word on our Vans RV-12 raffle with the proceeds benefitting our scholarships drive. We are a small aviation museum in South Central Texas, and a 501(c)(3) non-profit organization, and utilize antique aircraft to teach kids any of the aviation trades, from becoming a pilot, engineer, or A&P mechanic. The museum arose from the realization that kids in our area had little or no exposure to aviation, and a grass roots effort arose to create the museum, which morphed into the non-profit organization. At no expense to them, the kids learn in a J-3 Cub, and after soloing, transition into a Grumman Traveler for their PPL. So far, we've been pleased with our graduates. At present we have 5 kids in various aviation colleges (not too bad for a town of 2600 population) who will hopefully continue on into various aviation fields. In addition to their flight training, most kids here have flown the Stearman, TravelAir, etc. If they are so motivated, we teach them welding, woodworking, and the other skill sets that go into restoration and maintenance.

The RV12 we are raffling was built by a friend and supporter of the museum, Milton Weikel, who was a lifetime member of the EAA and hadn't missed the annual Fly In in Oshkosh, and before, when it first began in Rockford, IL, ever... not one. Milton built the airplane to completion, flew it about 5 hours, and then began building a Legal Eagle when he was stricken with a rare form of cancer and passed. He had a passion for aviation that was just boundless, and was always eager to help the kids. He was a powerful motivating force here, and is missed.

We painted the aircraft and are at present finishing the certification flights. We will send the aircraft to a Vans specialist to have all the Service Letters complied with immediately prior to the drawing. The airplane is essentially brand new, and beautifully constructed (Milton was an engineer by profession, and the craftsmanship is just beautiful) We are going to use the proceeds of the raffle to benefit our ongoing "Kids in Aviation" scholarships and allow us to begin a new crop of young pilots and mechanics, and will be called, "The Weikel Scholarship in ...", and will be offered in engineering, aviation and A&P mechanics. In addition to the airplane, several more prizes are offered and have been sponsored by some great aviation companies like David Clark, Sporty's, Aircraft Tool and Supply, and Garmin. I'm continuing to add prizes.

Kansas To Establish Supersonic Transportation Corridor

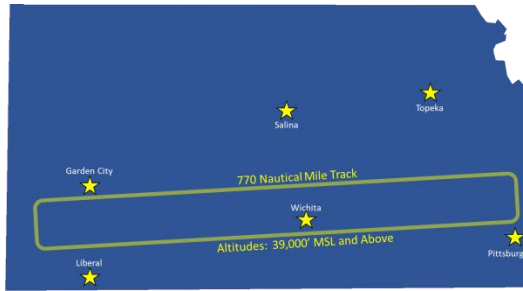

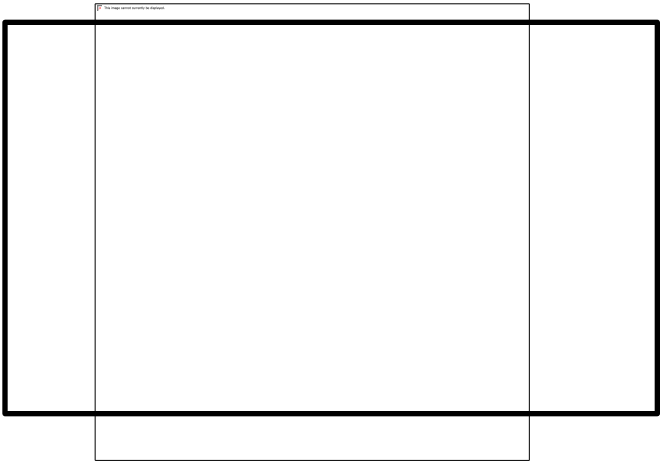
The Kansas Department of Transportation (KDOT) and the FAA have finalized an agreement to establish a supersonic transportation corridor (SSTC) for testing non-military supersonic aircraft. According to the Kansas Office of the Governor, the 770-NM corridor will "support sustained flight up to Mach 3." Specific points of entry will be designated for aircraft entering the SSTC and operations will take place at or above 39,000 feet.

"The Kansas Supersonic Transportation Corridor will assist in the assessment of sound mitigating structural and engine designs as well as state of the art atmospheric acoustic modeling that eliminates the sonic boom and shapes the noise signature of an aircraft traveling faster than the speed of sound to a very low volume rumble," said General Aviation Manufacturers Association (GAMA) CEO Pete Bunce. "The validation of these technological breakthroughs through the use of sophisticated ground acoustic and telemetry sensors will provide the necessary data to assist global regulators and policymakers in modernizing supersonic flight policies."

Procedures for SSTC operations were written by the KDOT Division of Aviation, FAA Central Region, Air Route Traffic Control Center and Lemasters Group Consulting. KDOT has also partnered with Wichita State University's National Institute of Aviation Research (NIAR) to collect noise data and telemetry from the aircraft. The gathered data is intended for use by the FAA and aircraft manufacturers for evaluating aircraft performance.
