MAY'S PROGRAM - Tony Monetti







Let's say someone graduated from the Air Force Academy and attained the rank of lieutenant colonel in the service. Let's also say he spent a significant part of his life flying exotic airplanes like the F-16, B-1, and B-2, and lead teams into aerial combat, completed myriad effective bombing sorties. Then he returns to civilian life to start a successful Italian restaurant, writes a couple of books, returns to the service at the personal request of a high-ranking general, then retires again and takes over an airport and the aviation department at an institution of higher learning; then quits that dream job to run for political office. That, my friends, may well define what it means to have a zest for life.

Tony Monetti started life in New York City as the American-born son of legal Italian immigrants. He attended the local Aviation High School where he spent half-days on airframe- and engine-related subjects, and the other half with normal high school liberal arts subjects. He was voted student body president, graduated with his diploma and an A&P rating, and was determined to attend the Air Force Academy. But then discovered he needed supplemental education to win that appointment which took place out of state and required \$7,000 in tuition. His father sacrificed his coveted \$7,000 "Cadillac fund" to permit Tony to acquire the special classes he needed.

What happened after is noted in the narrative above. Needless to say, our evening with Tony Monetti was an enthusiastic thirty-five walk through some of the most inspiring and motivational verbal scenery we've seen in a long time. He made clear his personal convictions without proselytizing, and expound on the magic of today's opportunities for young people wanting to enter aviation. Anyone's doubts were clearly swept away in the gushing sincere encouragement.

While Tony clearly has rock solid political and personal views, he presented himself as someone who attained extremely high personal achievements by adhering to standards many of us should emulate. Whether he succeeds in his political aspirations or not, no one would doubt that Tony Monetti is one substantial guy. If he succeeds, Congress and the people of Missouri will likely benefit. If not, we would love to have him come back to talk with us again. What a fun evening it was!

LEARNING ABOUT THE TRI-MOTOR







On Saturday evening, June 2, the pilot of EAA's Ford Tri-Motor stopped by the clubhouse to visit with a number of members and guests. John Hartke, a captain for Alaska Airlines, was a real airplane kid: he soloed at 16, received his private ticket at 17, and went on to earn a CFI before entering the military. There, he spent twenty years flying really nifty, speedy hardware with names that started with F, like F-16, F-18 . . . that kind. John explained the history of the Tri-Motor, detailing some of its finer points. This airplane, NC8407 is a 1929 5-AT model that was completely rebuilt over twelve years by EAA volunteers and returned to flight status in 1975 following devastating damage in a wind storm. Its three Pratt & Whitney R-985 radial engines with always-on superchargers, produced 450 horsepower each, enough to scoot this bird along at a heart stopping 90 MPH and maintain takeoff power up to 10,000 feet.

The design was a breakthrough change from the original wood-and-fabric airplanes preceding it. The signature corrugated skin provided incredible strength and significant weight savings. The design evolved from a line of airplanes created by A. M. Stoudt. Henry Ford became interested in the project and thus, the name. The Tri-Motor became the first practical passenger airliner and 199 were built. But thanks to rapidly advancing technology, served that role for only five years. After that, the Tri-Motors found themselves hauling freight and a few passengers in the outback areas of the world, including the wilds of Alaska.

John's talk was quite interesting with some topics coming from a training program used to inoculate new pilots and crewmembers, so we learned a lot. After taking several questions, John reformed the group out at the airplane where he provided an inspection-like view of many of its more mysterious parts.

This Tri-Motor and another one used by EAA have flown more than 20,000 passengers over the years, and have helped reintroduce the golden age of flying to many who could only read about it. Chapter 91 is pleased we could participate in this event, and want to thank everyone who participated.


AIRVENTURE CAMPING FEES DUE
