#### EAA CHAPTER 91 MINUTES OF THE MEETING February 11, 2017

The meeting of EAA Chapter 91 was called to order at 7:45 P.M. by President Mike Dooley in the hangar of the chapter building at Lee's Summit Airport. The Pledge of Allegiance to the flag was led by President Emeritus Larry Young. Mike introduced guests including Freda Renick and Emma Newland, who had worked during World War II as "Rosie the Riveters." Approximately 100 members and guests were present for the 2017 Annual Banquet.

Following the catered buffet dinner, the minutes of the January 16, 2017 meeting were approved as printed in the February newsletter. The nex t membership meeting would be March 20 with the program to be presented by Phil Schmidt. Phil had provided the paintings to be raffled that evening, one of a P -51 and one of a Pitts Special biplane. The paintings were won by chapter members Dennis Davis and Mike McKinzey.

Young Eagles Coordinator, Chris St. Germain, said despite weather challenges during September and October of 2016, the chapter had still been responsible for 387 Young Eagle flights. He presented certificates and pins to those who had volunteered during 2016 working with the Young Eagles program. Mike reminded members the plan for 2017 remained the same, i.e. a pancake breakfast the third Saturday each month, April through October. And Young Eagles rallies. Depending on weather, the main intersection of the 2 runways at LXT would be closed for 3 or more weeks beginning in March. After that the north/south runway would be closed until it was re -paved and the extension completed.

Chris Hope discussed the IMC club and invited members t o participate the second Monday of each month. Beginning in February, the group would discuss topics of interest for flying VFR. The new program, VMC, would alternate months with IMC interests.

Mike Dooley, assisted by Phil Ishmael, distributed pins and certificates to the officers of the chapter during 2016. He also presented President Emeritus, Larry Young with plaques depicting his plane. One would be hung in the hangar near where he parked his plane and one was given to Larry for his private use.

Fred Hulen had volunteered to clean and set up the meeting room for the March meeting.

A video regarding "Rosie the Riveter" was shown followed by a question and answer session with the two "Rosies" present. The evening concluded about 8:15 P.M. and Mike Dooley invited assistance in clearing the room.

When war was declared, Emma Newland and Freda Renick were in their last years of high school. Upon graduation, Emma left her family farm in Drexel, MO and Freda departed hers near Springfield, and headed to the big city to join the war effort. They both got jobs at the Fairfax plant in KCK where they built B-25s. The ladies worked from 1943 through 1945 and helped build more than 6,600 of the bombers. They had nine hour days, then went to movies at night. For the young and adventurous, it was an exciting time, but they knew their contributions had value.

The term "Rosie the Riveter" was coined as an effort to encourage women to step into the jobs left open by men who had left to join the fight. The program stated with a well-presented DVD documentary about the ladies known as Rosie, and ended with both Emma and Freda taking the dais with Mike Dooley to answer questions.

The audience was fascinated by these two 93 year old women who had no problem hearing the questions or answering them. Not only were they extremely sharp, but also humble and charming to boot. They easily recalled vignettes from their work, and answered the questions with dignity and humor. You have to love these ladies. They took up the slack, and we are grateful they did.

They don't make them like this anymore, and when they're gone, there won't be any more. What a terrific program it was!

# **CHAPTER 91 GETS A DAR**



If you haven't met new member Dave Jobe yet, be sure you do. He's easily approachable and kinda fun to talk with. A recent FAA retiree, Dave is also a Designated Airworthiness Representative (DAR) which means he's the guy who says yea or nay to your request for an airworthiness certificate. Dave owns Ambassador Certification and Consulting, LLC, one of our current sponsors. His

extensive background in aviation and the FAA makes him imminently qualified to hold that title.

Recently, Dave joined Chapter 91 and was invited to join Mark Burrow as a technical counselor. Our technical counselors and advisers work free of charge to assist members who are building, rebuilding or even thinking about building an aircraft. Technical counselors help increase the odds your project will pass the FAA's stringent requirements for an airworthiness certificate. So if you're involved in a project or are planning one, make sure you get with Dave and Mark early. They have agreed to work together for the benefit of our members, and that's one heck of a nocost benefit!

Dave holds an A&P certificate, and as a DAR, is authorized to work with anything from an amateur-built or light sport up to a Boeing 787. Dave was the proverbial airport kid who would wash airplanes for a free ride. He entered the U.S. Air Force where he worked as a jet engine technician. From there, he joined the FAA where he interfaced with the general aviation industry in quality control capacities. He worked with many manufacturers including kit suppliers RANs and Zenith. Dave also served on the National Kit Evaluation Team, which determined compliance for several popular kits.

So yes, Dave knows a lot and can help make your building job successful from the compliance perspective. Then, once you're ready to submit the paperwork for that much anticipated airworthiness certificate, just hire Ambassador Certification and Consulting, and Dave puts on his DAR hat where he inspects, reviews and passes judgment on the airworthiness of your project.

Dave's experience makes him a key factor when you are building an aircraft. He's seen it all; both from the government's side, and the builder's. # AIRPORT CONSTRUCTION UPDATE

As you probably know, LXT is facing considerable construction this summer. The north/south runway will be torn out and replaced, so bone up on your crosswind techniques.

Since construction is always weather dependent, there's no way to know exact details, but plans are to begin work soon. The first area will be the intersection of the two runways, and if everything works out as hoped, should last about three weeks. Of course, that will close the airport, but only temporarily. Once the intersection is done, the east/west runway will reopen.

Will this affect our Young Eagles events? Yes. But during the closures, we will still hold our monthly breakfasts and we expect good crowds. Please direct families to our website to stay abreast of the schedule. We plan to continue our Young Eagles flights as soon as the east/west runway is available.

John Ohrazda, the airport manager, is planning to hold meetings to address questions and issues for the flying community. As those schedules solidify, we will try to notify you. If we can, we'll even post notices on our website, so you please check there regularly.

Okay, so it's not fun and nobody's looking forward to the chaos. But remember, every year hundreds of U.S. airports close, never to reopen. The fact that LXT is being updated is a very positive note, and we should be happy it is getting this investment. So let's just grin and bear it: Someday we'll look back and laugh.
