The meeting of EAA Chapter 91 was called to order by President Mike Dooley at 7:00 P.M. in the chapter meeting room at Lee's Summit Airport. The Pledge of Allegiance was led by Rob Schmitt. Greetings were extended to members and guests. Guests were asked to introduce themselves.

The minutes of the March 19, 2018 meeting were approved as printed in the April newsletter. Treasurer Phil Ishmael presented a first quarter financial report.

A VMC Club meeting was scheduled May 14. The EAA's Ford Tri-Motor would be hosted by the chapter May 31 to June 4. The tour-stop coordinator was Wayne Moore with Phil Ishmael marketing coordinator. Volunteers were needed and sign-up sheet was available.

Young Eagle Coordinator Chris St. Germain said the first pancake breakfast and Young Eagles event was scheduled April 21. As of the date of the meeting, the forecast was not promising. Chris expected youth and adults with the Wright Flight group as well as a Cub scout group. He encouraged members to sign up to help either with the breakfast or Young Eagles. Hangar setup for April 21 was scheduled Friday afternoon, April 20, with a pot luck/cookout that evening beginning 5 P.M.

Larry Young, as program chairman, introduced the evening speaker, Ed Gabriel, who presented a video on "The Fighter Pilot."

## APRIL'S PROGRAM - FIGHTER PILOT







Occasionally a video serves as our monthly program. They're usually okay, but it's not often one of them gets applause at the end. However, Ed Gabriel's I-Max video presentation, "Fighter Pilot" did. It was one of the best we've seen and worked beautifully for April's presentation. The short production featured a visual excursion into Operation Red Flag, the international, two-week long military exercise where fighting forces from 123 countries train for air combat. Based on the tenant that surviving the first ten missions greatly increases the odds of success, Red Flag effectively delivers those first ten missions.

The opening narration featured a young navy pilot's inspiration from his grandfather, a WW-II F-4U Corsair pilot, then continued through Red Flag's opening days at Nellis Air Force Base on the northeast edge of Las Vegas, where the exercises take place. Sophisticated electronics permit meaningful combat simulations without the resultant bloodshed. There are not winners or losers – it's not a competition; just training. F-14s, F-15s, and F-16s A-10s, Harriers, Viggens, Tornadoes and more came from all over the world. And it included air-to-air refueling, SAM simulations, ground crew operations permitted air combat teams to mimic crucial exercises to prepare for the real thing. It's the best way to gain combat experience without actually being at risk, and we were there.

The program was riveting and chapter members were spellbound by what unfolded on the screen. It was a night well spent, and one we will remember for a long time. Our thanks once again to Ed Gabriel for bringing us such worthwhile education and entertainment.

# **FLYING BLIND**







At May's Young Eagles rally, we flew our first blind child. But the story doesn't stop there. Believe me, a couple of very lucky young orphans from Ukraine were adopted by the right American parents, and you're going to meet all of them right here.

Amanda and Chet Nachtmann of Hardin, MO, wanted to adopt, and when they saw Vika (pronounced Vicka) on a video, knew she was the one. But right behind her was Lena, singing up a storm, unknowingly auditioning for her most important audience. Chet and Amanda decided they had to have both girls. Chet works for the Job Corps training center in Excelsior Springs and Amanda, a skilled Braillist with the local school district, saw no problem with blind children. So in early 2013, after excruciating dealings with international bureaucracy, the couple traveled to Ukraine and returned with Lena, now 13 and Vika, now 12. The girls were not related biologically but both lived in an orphanage where special needs children were sent.

Lena and Vika had no schooling and spoke little English, so integrating them into an American family had its challenges. In the orphanage, one or both of the girls spent time in straightjackets, been drugged, suffered from PTSD and showed varying degrees of autism.

But under the strong and loving care of Amanda and Chet, the girls are thriving and learning to stand on their own two feet. They have to get themselves up in the morning, dress, and prepare for school. Lena especially has become very independent. The girls are being raised to be self-sufficient, preparing to face life head-on and to live on their own.

Lena was our Young Eagle for the day, and we hope Vika will decide to follow in her footsteps. But it's these kinds of activities, encouraged by two determined and loving parents, that will make Lena and Vika productive members of American society, and their Young Eagles experience will be a nurturing part of their future lives. We hope they will come see us again soon.

#### **WOMEN NOT IN SPACE**

Recently an article in the *Wall Street Journal* caught my attention. A picture's caption showed a familiar name, plus a Cessna 180 sat in the background, so obviously it required further reading. Here's what's described.

Beginning in the late 1950s, NASA developed the Mercury Project which focused on putting humans in space. Seven men were selected to participate and became known as the Mercury 7. You may remember names like John Glenn, Alan Shepard, Gus Grissom, and Scott Carpenter as being involved with that program.

What we didn't know was that women were also being considered. There were thirteen ultimately selected, and became known as the Mercury 13, which is also the title of the Netflix documentary.

Extensive physical, psychological and emotional testing proved, in some areas, women were better suited to the rigors of space flight than men. So it was logical to pursue the subject. Eventually that part of the program was scuttled on quasi-political grounds (I'm trying to be delicate here) that effectively removed the women from participation.

What makes this topic interesting to Chapter 91 members is that one of us, Sarah Ratley, was among that group of thirteen women. Sarah's story is featured prominently in the Nextflix program.

I will not review the show here, but I will tell you I have watched it and would strongly encourage you to do the same. It is well worth your time. Masterfully shot, extremely interesting, and refreshingly objective are just a few of the descriptive phrases that best describe the documentary. But I'm not a movie critic so you'll just have to judge for yourself.

After watching the program, I'm most impressed with the ladies and how they handled such extreme disappointment. They were all made of pretty stern stuff, and I can only wish they had been allowed to move forward in that program.

Of course, women have since flown in space, but the originals should have been given that chance. They earned it. My respect for Sarah and what she did has grown substantially. After you watch *Mercury 13*, introduce yourself and visit with Sarah at one of our upcoming chapter meetings. She's frequently there.


#### THE TRI-MOTOR IS COMING
