President's Corner

EAA Chapter 91 president, Mike Dooley

As most of you are aware, AirVenture 2020 has been cancelled. This was the best possible decision by EAA leadership under some very difficult circumstances.

I know many of us (me included) are disappointed. However, cancelation may create opportunities to make improvements on the grounds and accomplish maintenance that was deferred from previous years. If you'd like to assist EAA with small projects at Oshkosh this summer in the form of facility maintenance/upgrades please let me know. I've been there before for this kind of volunteer work and had a great time!

We're still under a Jackson County stay-at-home order. The Eastern Jackson County Recovery Plan, Phase I, will be implemented on May 11. Phase I will limit gatherings to no more than ten people, with appropriate social distancing, masks, sanitizing procedures, etc. Phase 1 will run for a minimum of 14 days, but even then we will face a new set of restrictions, to be outlined as future phase plans are released.

This means we will have a "slow restart" as we try to get back to normal. We should be able to conduct one-on-one activities such as individual Young Eagle flights, Eagle flights, and small team events such as the Young Eagle Build and Fly program. I'm also planning to host one-on-one workshop sessions: Riveting 101, Electrical 101, etc. Contact me if you're interested in learning a new skill!

However, "normal" EAA Chapter 91 meetings/gatherings involving larger groups will not be held at the Eagle Hangar but we will continue to have online gatherings for chapter board meetings and monthly programs.

We had a great turnout for our first-ever online chapter meeting on April 20. Jim Brady discussed the aerospace program at St. Michael the Archangel High School with over 50 members and guests logged in. A special thanks to Jim for providing a great program!

Our next online gathering on Monday evening, May 18 will include:

- Social time beginning at 6:30 pm to allow everyone to get logged in.
- A few announcements at 7pm followed by two programs:
- o Larry Rhoads will provide a "tour" of his Sopwith Baby biplane. This is the newest aircraft in the chapter since it was just inspected and certified at the end of January.

Check out this video from AOPA; and here is AOPA's and here is AOPA's system for organizing a focused review. We will talk about this in a bit more detail.

APRIL'S PROGRAM – AVIATION AT SMA HIGH







Our April chapter gathering was a first. It was held online and accessed by the members through the GoToMeeting app, allowing everyone to remain socially distanced yet be so near. A few had difficulty logging on, but overall, the results were surprisingly good and well received to boot. While most everyone would agree meeting in person is preferred, this really isn't that bad, especially for what's hopefully the short term.

The venerable Jim Brady gave an informative presentation covering the STEM-based aviation program at St. Michael the Archangel High School, which is just off the north departure of Runway 36. AOPA helped develop the curriculum which is in an increasing number of U.S. schools.

Jim presented pictures of some of the activities. A video showed students representing airplanes being controlled by ATC. Apparently that was a stressful situation and proved to be a real eye opener. Other images depicted lessons in the effects of air pressure on peeps (I had no idea what a peep was), airfoil and wind tunnel training aids, how they learned about runway markings, and even Styrofoam models carved to graphically represent airspace categories. Jim explained how the program is focused on aviation and not just pilot training. Once completed, students should be able to pass the private pilot written exam.

The St. Michael's program currently has about twenty-three students out of the four hundred total, but is showing signs of growing interest as it moves past its third year of operation. The curriculum varies for each of the four grade levels.

Thanks to the current Covid-19 pandemic, the classes are being held online. A few of the kids are involved with our Build and Fly radio control program so we continue to have more than a handshake relationship with the school.

Jim, as always, did an outstanding job presenting an interesting story to the membership. We look forward to learning more about this impressive program and how it affects the lives of some of Kansas City's bright kids. Thanks, Jim.

MAY'S ONLINE GATHERING INVITATION

-- EVERYTHING YOU NEED TO KNOW ABOUT HOW TO GET ONLINE --

Following the success of our April online gathering, and because both local and state authorities have not yet released us from house arrest, we will be holding our May chapter gathering using the same miraculous cyber system as last time. Below you'll find the keys to the kingdom. Under the heading, "Please join my meeting . . ." is the important one for most of us. To join the fun, most will be able to just click on that URL (Uniform Resource Locator) and things will happen magically. However, a few may have found your email system won't allow you access from a simple click. In that case, you can swipe your curser across the blue URL, then copy and paste it into your favorite web browser. Remember, to copy, place your curser at the beginning of the URL address and hold down the left button, swipe to the end of the address, then release the button. Now hold down the Control key and press the C key. Now, move your curser to your web browser (Foxfire, Google Chrome, Internet Explorer, Microsoft Edge, Safari [for Apple], or another similar program), and paste it into the browser address line by holding down the Control key and tapping the V key. However, if any of this is still foreign, swallow your pride, go grab a neighborhood twelve-year-old, look helpless, and slip him or her a ten-spot. You'll be online before you know it! Of course, you may also logon using your telephone. Just follow the instructions listed below.

If you do not have the GoToMeeting app installed on your computer, see the last segment below. It takes just a few minutes and you'll want get it well before the gathering. Go to that website and follow the simple directions. Don't imitate me and try to make it more difficult than it is. Keep it simple. Once the app is installed, come back to this page, use that "Please join my meeting . . ." thingy, and you'll be taken directly to the gathering. You WILL NOT do anything with the app. It just needs to be on the computer – that's all. And just FYI, each meeting has a unique identification number which is cleverly included at the end of the line. That's how your system knows which meeting you are to attend. Please note: because of that DO NOT try to join this month's online gathering by clicking on last month's URL. It won't work. (Yeah, do what I say, not what I did!)

AIRVENTURE CANCELLED FOR 2020

Just in case you hadn't seen the official notice from Mr. Pelton himself. here it is. While it's a shame, EAA really had no choice. Read on

We Don't Gamble, We Need A Sure Thing AirVenture 2020 is officially canceled

My fellow EAA'rs. It is May here in Wisconsin, and unfortunately like many of you across the country, we are still under a stay at home order through May 26. Normally, this is the month when we start our preflight planning for EAA AirVenture Oshkosh. By this time, we should have begun ramping up our entire site in preparation for our July convention. Volunteers from across the country and world would have descended on Oshkosh. Together they would have formed work parties, our suppliers would begin start setting up tents and infrastructure. Our EAA staff would be printing wrist bands, campers guides, programs and an assortment of EAA collateral as full-on AirVenture execution begins.

But because of circumstances beyond our control, none of this can happen now. We cannot even get to the hangar so our preflight is left to watching the prog charts. While this certainly makes the ability to prepare for the event a scheduling problem, it does not preclude the bigger issue of predicting what will be the health guidelines in July. Right now, there are three phases that have been defined in Wisconsin as the recommended procedures. As I write this, we are not in Phase 1 yet. Phase 2 restricts gatherings to 50 people. Phase 3 allows for mass gathering with restrictions.

Our convention attracts EAA members not only from the U.S. but around the world. Today we cannot predict when we will be at a point that our event meets the all clear Phase 3 milestone for mass gathering with restrictions. As your leader, I see no clear path to meet our own requirements to insure the health and safety expectations our organization demands for our employees, members, volunteers, exhibitors and attendees. That includes sanitization, separation and personal protection requirements.

My conclusion is, like in any good flight planning, don't take the risk. Therefore, I have no choice but to cancel AirVenture 2020. Together, we can come back stronger, safer and ready for AirVenture 2021 and create a memorable world class aviation event. Because of our dedicated and enthusiastic EAA members, our Association is strong. We know that at some point this storm will pass. And over the next 12 months we will continue to support all of you as we again, together, grow EAA in the Spirit of Aviation.

FAA SFAR Offers Extensive Regulatory Relief

The FAA has published a Special Federal Aviation Regulation (SFAR) designed to provide regulatory relief for individuals unable to meet some training, experience, testing and checking requirements due to the coronavirus (COVID-19) pandemic. The SFAR includes provisions for expiring flight instructor and medical certificates, recent flight experience requirements, flight reviews, knowledge tests and inspection authorizations. The special regulation will go into effect immediately following its publication in the Federal Register.

"Since March 2020 and with each month thereafter, a new group of pilots becomes unavailable to perform critical operations because they cannot comply with certain training, recent experience, testing, or checking requirements," the FAA said. "This SFAR will provide temporary relief to certain individuals whose qualifications would otherwise lapse, to ensure there are a sufficient number of qualified personnel available to conduct essential aviation activities during this period."

The SFAR (PDF) extends the validity of medical certificates that expire from March 31, 2020, through May 31, 2020, until June 30, 2020. The agency emphasized that the prohibition on operations during medical deficiency remain unchanged. Similarly, the validity of flight instructor certificates expiring between March 31, 2020, and May 31, 2020, will be extended until June 30. Flight instructor certificates renewed during the grace period will retain their original expiration month. FAA knowledge tests expiring between March and June have also been granted an additional three calendar months.

Under the SFAR, pilots with biennial flight reviews due March through June 2020 can extend the 24calendar-month requirement by three calendar months provided they have "logged at least 10 hours of PIC time within the twelve calendar months preceding the month the flight review was due" and completed FAA Safety Team online courses totaling at least three WINGS credits. A grace period for instrument currency has been established until June 30 as long as the pilot has "logged at least three instrument approaches in actual weather conditions, or under simulated conditions using a viewlimiting device" within the six calendar months preceding a flight. The SFAR also provides a threemonth extension for mechanics with inspection authorization to complete renewal requirements originally due by March 31, 2020.
