SEPTEMBER'S PROGRAM - CHRISTOPHER GRASSO







A brief, unofficial poll conducted shortly before September's Chapter 91 gathering indicated that I was not the only one who had never heard of the Crawford Automobile and Aviation Museum in Cleveland, Ohio. My sigh of relief was audible since I hate being the only one who has no idea what someone is talking about, though I should be used to it by now. It also helped the presenter, Christopher Grasso, who must have enjoyed looking out at that audience riveted to his presentation.

Chris spend several years as the assistant curator of the museum, which followed an internship at the Henry Ford Museum in Dearborn, Michigan which, in turn, followed his Ph. D studies at Case Western University. Chris was born in Nebraska but spent his early years in West Des Moines, Iowa before coming to Lee's Summit in the early 80s, where he graduated from Lee's Summit High School. He went on to earn a BA and an MA in history and technology. Because a friend's father was building a plane in his garage (Why does that sound so familiar?), he fell in love with airplanes, though his primary focus was on drag racing muscle cars. So that dual interest served him well at a museum specializing in both automotive and aviation livery.

As a technical historian, Chris was hired by the Crawford Museum where he helped organize, categorize and provide information to visitors about the museum's various unusual displays. His presentation focused on the aviation side of the house for obvious reasons, and he walked us through several of the winged exhibits. Like the Howard DGA-3 "Pete" racing plane, originally built in St. Louis in 1930. This was during the heydays of pylon racing, and Pete, with only a 90 horsepower engine, proved fast enough to earn a place in aviation history. It won many first and second place races over the course of its career in such venues as the National Air Races, the Thompson Trophy Races, and many more. Speeds up to 163 MPH made it a fan favorite. Later, Pete morphed into other airplanes, including the Baker Special in 1947, and ultimately becoming Little Audrey, in honor of Paul Poberezny's wife.

Chris outlined several other aircraft including the Goodyear F2G-1 Corsair, with its incredible 3,000 horsepower radial engine. Then he explained he moved back to Lee's Summit in 2017 and with his soon-to-be-wife, came to LXT to view the Ford Tri-Motor Chapter 91 brought in. That wrapped the evening and after answering several questions, we all went away vowing to go see that amazing museum in Cleveland.

Third class? Basic Med? Which flight medical system do you use? Are you considering letting your class III expire so you can convert to Basic Med? You know there are pros and cons, so how might they affect you? When Congress finally agreed to change the physical requirements for initial-level pilots, it sounded like a great idea. But, as always, what we wanted is not exactly what we received. The FAA's

one-toe-in-the-water approach has proven not to be the panacea we had hoped for. In fact, many physicians are understandably reluctant to participate in Basic Med thanks to liability and insurance reasons most of us never considered.

Basic Med is a big topic, and finally, we can get a physician's point of view that relates to us. Our speaker Dr. Keith Cochran is a pilot, a physician, and a former military flight surgeon. As a physician, his views on Basic Med, with a cardiovascular perspective, are well worth hearing. That's why you'll want to join us for our next chapter gathering, Monday, October 21 at the Larry Young Eagle Hangar, because Dr. Keith Cochran, D.O. will be explaining and exploring the ins and outs of our current flight medical options. Be sure you're in your seat by 7 p.m. because we're expecting a sell-out crowd. Guests are always welcome. And if you have questions, bring them. This may be your chance to get some straight answers directly from a doctor who understands the system, and how it relates to us.

NEXT YOUNG EALGES AND POTLUCK COOKOUT

Our Young Eagles season is coming to a close with the final rally and pancake breakfast on Saturday, October 19. We have been very fortunate to have had such good volunteers this year, and we hope you'll continue your support as we complete this very active season.
