#### **AUGUST'S PROGRAM**







Long ago, in high school, I took a couple of years of chemistry. I don't remember much, but there was something about moles (though they weren't furry little animals) and the periodic table was a bit abbreviated from what it is today. I also recall using slide rules to solve problems, and wearing face protection for some experiments. That may be the extend of my memory. Of course, it was so long ago, most of it has slowly evaporated from my mental pending file.

Griff Pickett, on the other hand, must have been a chemistry star. As the presenter for our last chapter program, he easily belted out complicated chemical terms that got my tongue tangle up with my teeth. Plus he really understood them! But the essence of his talk was about using alternative materials and chemicals to build components for our experimental airplanes. Like how to make a fuel tank from composites rather than from sheet metal. And why would we want to do that? Well, for one thing, because composite materials can be formed to most any complex shape, where sheet metal could not. Ah! That makes sense. And I didn't have to draw heavily from my extensive chemistry background to figure that out either. Good job, Griff!

Griff let his actions speak by taking us into the hangar to demonstrate first-hand how to construct from these alternative materials. His demonstration triggered several questions from attendees who were clearly dealing with the need for unconventional building methods. While I personally don't speak chemical very well, the program did drive home that thinking outside the box has its place. And luckily, since we deal with experimental aircraft, we have the freedom to experiment with such options. Thanks for the tips, Griff! Now go tell those KR builders how to do it. They look like they could use the help.

If you are planning to replace your class III medical with the FAA's new BasicMed program, you may be looking for a physician to navigate the new system. Many practitioners are not aware of the changes. Most assume they still need FAA authorization, and some are overly concerned about potential liability issues. That, of course, complicates our search for qualified medical assistance.

But sometimes, fate has a way of intervening at just the right time. Like the afternoon of our last chapter potluck cookout when Mike Dooley happened to

recognize a guy lurking around the airport. Turns out that guy was Dr. Keith Cochran, DO, DC, Col US Army (Retired), and they had met several years ago at Fort Hood. It seems, among other things, Dr. Cochran had once been a flight surgeon so he knew a thing or two about flying and flight physicals. He is also a pilot, though not current for several years.

Dr. Cochran recently returned to the Kansas City area and has a medical office in Lee's Summit. Being retired from the military, he was not desperate for patients. But as a civilian pilot, and a licensed physician, he is the perfect guy to fulfill those BasicMed requirements and is willing to do so. 
#### ONE MORE COOKOUT DATE CHANGE
