COVID Update: There are no current restrictions.

As announced last month, EAA Chapter 91 has once again been selected as a 2022 Ray Scholarship chapter! As part of this program, Chapter 91 will administer a flight training scholarship to enable a deserving youth to cover flight training expenses (potentially up to \$10,000 for a private pilot certificate). We will be seeking scholarship applicants between now and May. Qualifications are listed on EAA's website, or for further information you may contact Jim Brady or Griff Pickett.

We held our fourth Tungsten Inert Gas (TIG) welding class on April 2, with three participants getting some great instruction from Tab Sunderland. This one was hosted by John Rice – thanks John and Tab! We still have a small waiting list, but if you haven't signed up and would like to add TIG welding to your resume, please let me know! More classes will be scheduled in late April or early May.

We also had a great start for the Young Eagles Build and Fly (RC) Program on April 2! Six families began construction of the wings for the second model, a SIG eKadet LT-40 electric trainer with a 70-inch wingspan. The group was able to complete most of the wing structure. Model construction will continue this month (and into May if needed) with the goal of having the model ready to fly at the Lake Jacomo RC field this summer. If you know of a youth who would be interested in the program (or if you would like to volunteer to be part of the team), please reach out to me or our program coordinator, Susan Calvin. There is no cost to participate.

The Eagle Hangar kitchen renovation project is rapidly moving forward – at last! As I write this the plumbing and electrical have been "roughed-in" and I'm scheduling our first inspection with the city. Once we pass the inspection we'll be able to replace the drywall, paint, tile, install cabinets, etc. That work will be followed by final installation of our fixtures and inspections by the city and county. If you have construction skills, or would like to learn some new ones, you're welcome to join the team!

Preparations continue for our first Young Eagles Rally of 2022 on Saturday April 16th from 8:30 to noon. The online reservation system is set for 55 participants and is filling up rapidly. LAST MONTH'S PROGRAM - FRED SCHIESZER







Well, he did it again. I've seen him do it before — hold a large audience in the palm of his hand by telling fascinating stories about things most people wouldn't care about or understand. But he always pulls it off, no matter what the topic. One dead giveaway when Fred Schieszer is scheduled to speak is how many people show up. True to form, last month's gathering was full to the gills. I'm still not sure how he does it, but it's sure fun to watch.

Fred's topic was the CG-4A gliders used to insert infantry troops during World War II. And there was a significant Kansas City connection. Fred explained the whole story by interspersing verbal interjections with a couple of videos that — can you believe it? — had stories of their own. Like the fact that one video was created by a former student who needed just a few extra credits to keep his scholarship. Since that particular student was also a musician, he actually played all the instruments used in the background music. Only Fred would have stories like that.

Many of the Waco-designed gliders were built by Porterfield, which at the time was where the current American Royal building sits. Further, the origin of what is now Whiteman Air Force Base was home of the original glider training field.

Glider pilots served dual roles — first, to fly the aircraft into the LZ and then to become infantry soldiers. That was unique to this field. The gliders held between eight and fifteen soldiers, or, with a different configuration, could carry weapons or vehicles. They were towed aloft by nearly any twin-engine (or larger) aircraft in the military arsenal including C-47s, B-25s, and even P-38s. The gliders cost a bit over \$15,000 each and there were about 5,000 pilots trained to fly them.

After a battle was over, many of the gliders were actually removed from the landing zone – sometimes by snatching them from where they lay or by being partially disassembled and moved to launch areas.

Fred told numerous stories about how surplus gliders were used, and talked a lot about the "Glider Gang" who rebuilt a CG-4A at Whiteman. If you didn't make it to the last meeting, you missed a lot, because only Fred Schieszer can tell stories like that! Thanks, Fred! You did it again.

THIS MONTH'S PROGRAM

With last month's program featuring scenes from World War II, it's only appropriate that our next gathering should focus on its predecessor. Our speaker, Terry Collins, is associated with the World War I museum in Kansas City, and is so knowledgeable that he actually trains the docents who volunteer to conduct speaking tours of the facilities. Mr. Collins is well known for his expertise, and we're pleased to welcome him to present this significant topic for our next chapter gathering on Monday, April 18.

PHIL HEDRICK SCHOLARSHIP

Thanks to the generous contributions from the Phil Hedrick estate, Chapter 91 has decided to dedicate these funds to developing our own scholarship program. Phil Hedrick was a nurse on an medical helicopter that went down on a mission, causing him serious bodily harm. Thanks to a substantial settlement from that accident, Phil was in a position to donate monetarily to aviation causes, which he loved. WE'RE A RAY SCHOLARSHIP CHAPTER AGAIN

By now, most everyone knows that Chapter 91 has once again been granted the honor of hosting a Ray Scholarship candidate. This scholarship provides up to \$10,000 toward a pilot's license and is open to deserving applicants aged 15 for a glider license, or between 16 and 19 for powered flight ratings.

While any youth who has achieved the appropriate ages shown above may apply, special consideration will be given to former Young Eagles, and particularly those involved with Sporty's online exam-prep program. Candidates must hold a student pilot's certificate, and a valid Class III medical if pursuing a private pilot ticket. Winning the scholarship requires successful candidates to begin flight training within 60 days of receiving the award. Further, they must agree to volunteer at least two hours per month to chapter-related activities.

The Ray Scholarship is a worthy goal, but demands a great deal from those wishing to earn it. Past efforts have shown to be insanely competitive, with most candidates so close, the final decision proved totally exhausting for the selection committee.
