During the chapter board meeting discussion of setting up PayPal, we decided it is probably time for an increase in our yearly member dues. I'm pretty sure it hasn't changed for a couple of decades. For the rest of this year, it will remain at \$24 per year. For use of the PayPal system we will be asking for \$26. In 2024 we will be increasing the member dues to \$36 peryear. We will still prorate new members who join us during the year at \$2 per month for 2023 and \$3 per month for 2024. You can still always pay your dues by check or cash – no problem. LAST MONTH'S PROGRAM



Phil Schmid's new Zenith 601 isn't painted – it's wrapped in vinyl. The wrap materials and tools cost significantly less than a professional paint job, so he immediately had everyone's attention. Investing fewer than \$2,000 is a far cry from what a professional paint job would cost. But how all it came about and what he did to create the beautiful graphics was well worth hearing.

This gorgeous overnight success took only eighteen years to complete, thanks to several relocations, some of which lacked adequate building space. Of course, during the build process, Phil and his wife, Lynn, put a lot of thought into how the finished airplane would look. Being an artist, he created his own design and color combinations which included Lynn's favorite color, teal.

The couple did lots of research and found great help from contributors from YouTube and other online resources. During that time they discovered that Jeff Schulz's son had used a vinyl wrap on his new Sonex, so consultations ensued and the ultimate plan began to take shape. Phil said it was quite a learning experience including how nearly all of the absolutely mandatory tools and devices required for successful completion were not absolutely mandatory after all. In fact, almost none were ever used. But that's what makes it a learning experience. He advised which tools and vinyl brands worked best, and which would help manage costs.

But vinyl isn't paint, so new points needed to be considered. Like how to prevent high airflow from peeling the vinyl away. Paint doesn't have that problem, but it underscored the need to start at the back, work one area at a time, and move forward. It's a meticulous process: each of the wheel pants took some three hours to complete. Using that artist's eye, Phil designed a flowing, multi-color scheme that required special cutting tape to make those curves possible. That was the crux of Phil's demonstration, and it was fascinating.

If you are building or considering building your own aircraft, vinyl wrapping should be considered for your project. Phil offered to help where he could, and would even create a design for a reasonable price. Better give it some thought.

THIS MONTH'S PROGRAM

Our speaker, Terry Collins, is a retired engineer with a lifelong interest in the evolution and tactics of the aircraft from the Great War era. The last time Terry was with us, he provided a deep insight into a number of the airplanes used in that war and even displayed them in exact scale proportions using special models mounted on extended stands to illustrate their altitude ceilings. At the completion of that presentation we asked, and he agreed to return sometime in the future to tell us even more. That time has come and we are looking forward to hearing the rest of the story. Even if you missed that initial talk, you will still gain a great deal from hearing Terry's outstanding presentation.

This banquet is shaping up to be another successful evening, and we certainly hope you have made your advanced reservations. Remember, even though it's on a Saturday, it will serve as our February meeting so we will not congregate on the usual third Monday of the month. This is the one exception to our regular schedule.

NOW YOU CAN PAY DUES BY PAYPAL

Chapter 91 can now accept dues payments using PayPal. This will make that annual transaction easier and more convenient. Since fewer checks are used and postage costs have skyrocketed, we hope that this option will make your duespaying with the chapter simpler. Not long ago we created a merchant account that has proven valuable for our Young Eagles breakfasts, but the credit card must be swiped. That means you need to be present to use it. What was lacking was the ability for members to pay their dues other than in person or through the mail. Our PayPal account will correct that.

You will find the payment buttons on our website, eaachapter91.org. Scroll down about 2/3 of the page and you'll see this:



Just click on the blue PayPal button and you'll be guided through the easy and probably recognizable steps to complete your transaction. Yes, you will need a PayPal account, but that can be established as a one-time-only event when you use the above app. It's super easy, and there are no extra charges to set up your account. Of course, if you already have one, you're good. Or, if you prefer, use your credit or debit card on the second button.

As you probably know, the chapter pays a fee for each transaction, so we have adjusted our dues structure to accommodate. Our \$24 annual dues have been around since dinosaurs roamed the Earth, so it just makes sense to bring them into the modern age. Here's the deal: For the rest of 2023, your dues will be \$26 *if pay via PayPal*, but only \$24 by check or cash. So there is a neat little discount if you have not yet paid your dues. Of course if you already have paid, you're completely off the hook; just file this information away for next year's dues.

We want to update your financial resources even further, but costs must be considered. Ultimately, we will accept credit and debit cards for other transactions, but for now, it's just dues. In the meantime, feel free to access our new capability. Yes, we still accept cash and checks, but now you have a choice.

CHAPTER DUES ARE CHANGING

Over the years, Chapter 91's board of directors has kicked around the idea of increasing our annual dues. While it was mentioned on many occasions, nothing ever happened. Our financial status has always been (and still is) very solid, so no action was taken. Our \$24 dues, which you have to admit is more than reasonable, have been around for a long time. But now that we are accepting PayPal and other fee-based methods of payment (see Page 8) for our dues, plus the explosive increase in inflation, the need to increase them became clear.

So here is the schedule. For the rest of 2023, the dues will remain at \$24 if paid by check, money order, or cash. If payment is by PayPal, debit card, or credit card, the rate is now \$26. If you have already paid your 2023 dues, this will not affect you one bit. But if you have not yet paid them, it does.

The big change will take place for 2024 when our dues will increase to \$36 per year. While nobody enjoys raising rates, we hope you'll recognize the necessity to do so. Frankly, it shows solid fiscal responsibility, which you should expect and demand from this organization. If you have any questions, feel free to ask any officer or board member. They will be glad to address you inquiries.

NO FEBRUARY SOCIAL

Because of the timing for our annual banquet, which will be on Saturday, February 18 starting at 6 p.m., we will not be holding our regular monthly social potluck dinner for the month of February. Yes, we hear the sad sighs, but really, we're trying to help with that expanding waistline issue. We don't want to contribute to the problem. RAY SCOLARSHIP PAYOUT INCREASED

The cost to earn a pilot's license is already so high that fewer aspiring candidates will be able to make the leap. Thanks to some forward-thinking benefactors such as those from the Ray Scholarship, a few lucky hopefuls have improved their odds of reaching the dream.

When inflation rears its nasty head, squeezing more from what's available can be tricky. But the Ray Scholarship people recognized the need for increased funds, and have announced that the next scholarship awards will be for a maximum of \$11,000, up from the earlier \$10,000 – a solid 10% increase.

That kind of foresight and concern is impressive, and while unexpected, will certainly be appreciated by the applicants. Being more able to afford the high costs of flight instruction means a greater number of seekers will win. Clearly that is good for GA and every other aspect of aviation.

As you probably know, Chapter 91 is bidding to host another Ray Scholar this year, and we expect to be appointed very soon. That, of course, means we will begin the selection process for choosing our next candidate very soon. If you know of a young person sixteen to nineteen (fifteen for a glider rating) who dreams of flying, please contact Jim Brady, Griff Pickett, or any officer or board member. We want to help another budding flyer win that prize.

HEDRICK SCHOLARSHIP APPLICATIONS OPEN

Chapter 91, using seed funds provided from the estate of the late Phil Hedrick, created the eponymous scholarship which is available to any aviator or pilot candidate regardless of age. While it's qualifications are less restrictive than the Ray Scholarship, it's also for a much smaller amount – \$1,500. But successful candidates can use the money for almost any aviation-related purpose, like helping pay for another rating. Or even to help to get the initial license.

With the Hedrick Scholarship's success in the recent past, the board has authorized the opening of our first scholarships for 2023. Since it is chapter-related and funded, we would love to award the funds to a chapter member or someone with ties to the chapter. But we are flexible and would consider any legitimate proposal.
