### LAST MONTH'S PROGRAM



We had to wait an extra month to hear Paul Brown's much anticipated talk about back-country flying, but the wait was worth it. Paul's enthusiasm for the subject was apparent, and it's easy to see why he is such an accomplished aviator. But the poor guy had no choice. After all, his mother was a captain for United Airlines, he soloed a glider at 12, holds an A&P and is about to earn his IA, ended up at the Air Force Academy (as did his wife), received air force flight training, flew five combat tours in Afghanistan, was on the A-10 Demonstration Team, still flies for the military and regularly handles the heavy iron for the airlines, so what do you expect?

In addition to all this background, Paul, who had family in Alaska, developed a taste for flying in the barrens of Alaska , Idaho, and other God-forsaken places. Recognizing that many share at least the desire to do the same, Paul approached the subject very much like a clinic on what to expect and how to prepare. Since he had given similar seminars for AOPA, this one was a natural. With that, we learned some of the visual differences between this type of flying and what most of us experience in the civilized world. For example, our airports don't disappear under us. Paul emphasized that you must be very current and highly proficient in the type of plane you are flying in order to survive. He discussed which planes worked in the rough country, and which did not. The mission determines the airplane. He also described what to look for prior to landing at what may or may not be an airstrip.

And as if flying in Alaska's back country weren't challenging enough, Idaho, with its extreme elevations and high density altitudes, proved even more so. He further discussed various tools such as large tundra tires and even skis. He explained why having super sharp slow-flight skills was mandatory, and how appropriate was the motto: "Try not to be the first one to tackle a new strip."

So, why fly in the back country? Paul says it's simply a matter of going to cool places and doing cool things. I don't think anyone disagreed.

### THE KANSAS CITY AIRSHOW

It came out of nowhere: the Kansas City Air Show. Nobody actually thought they could pull it off, but they did. And it was amazing! For the first time, the U.S. Air Force Thunderbirds and the U.S. Navy Blue Angels appeared at the same venue. But so did the Leap Frogs and the Golden Knights, the navy and army parachute teams respectively. It was a first that will most likely never be repeated, so if you were there, you probably witnessed history. Frankly, the whole thing was incredible both days.

The Independence Day weekend brought our more than one hundred thousand people to experience the show. Reports indicate everyone had a positive impression. You can imagine the extreme difficulty the organizers had arranging for new facilities of New Century Airport as well as gaining firm commitments from various performers so quickly after the goofiness of the Covid mess. But they really pulled it off. Everything went smoothly and the few hiccups noted on Saturday were absent on Sunday. Parking appeared to be inconvenient, but the huge fleet of luxury buses transported revelers to the flight line smoothly.

The cleanliness of the venue was impressive and was emphasized with frequent visits from trash collection crews and people sweeping up the typical detritus that accompanies large events. Courteous officials and highly visible police and first-aid staff eased the comfort level even further.

The airshow itself was every bit as professional as you would expect. The announcer was a total pro and kept the program moving smoothly. Being a pilot himself, his frequent asides and explanations added immensely to the audience's understanding and appreciation for what was happening in the sky.

Chapter 91 members were ably aided by several non-member friends who came to help. We had been invited to assist with various aspects of the show and must have done our jobs well because event coordinator Phil Ishmael announced we had earned more than \$6,300 plus tips totaling \$2,000. All of this money will go directly into the chapter's coffers and is earmarked for Young Eagles and youth-flying activities. Thanks to everyone who helped. You did great!

Chapter 91 was once again complimented by being allowed to host another Ray Scholarship candidate for 2021.
