As a 2022 Ray Scholarship chapter, we will administer a flight training scholarship to enable a deserving youth to cover flight training expenses – up to \$10,000 for a private pilot certificate. We are seeking applicants by the end of May. Qualifications are on EAA's website, or contact Jim Brady or Griff Pickett.

I'm also happy to report that Chapter 91 has again been designated as a "Gold" chapter (the highest rating) for 2020 and 2021. Expect to see a new banner soon! We held our fifth TIG welding class on May 7. Thanks to John Rice for hosting and Tab Sunderland for instructing! There's a small waiting list, so an additional class will be scheduled later in May.

Our Young Eagles Build and Fly (RC) Program continues to make great progress and began covering the wing on May 7. The team is building a SIG eKadet LT-40 electric trainer with a 70-inch wingspan. Model construction will continue this month with the goal of having the model ready to fly at the Lake Jacomo RC field this summer. CHAPTER 91 WINS GOLD SEAL AGAIN



Dear Chapter President,

Congratulations to your chapter in successfully reaching the GOLD level status recognition level for the combined 2020 and 2021 years. EAA is happy to present you with a chapter recognition banner to proudly display where your chapter meets. Your level also will be displayed online at EAA.org/FindAChapter with a specially designed emblem. You are encouraged to use your emblem on your website, newsletter, and other promotional materials; your chapter emblem is attached in this email.

To review your chapters overall scoring, please see the attached spreadsheet document, and simply find your chapter.

This program was developed and measured in partnership with EAA's Chapter Advisory Council, and is based on 10 criteria that are consistently found in active and highly engaged chapters. Due to 2020 and 2021 being, challenging years for chapters to maintain a high level of engagement, these years have been combined into a single recognition period. This was done to help chapters have a longer period of time to engage in the 10 criteria. An additional 11th criteria point was included this year to help offset the unique challenges associated with limited social engagement, and to observe unique chapter approved activities. Each is worth a point, and there are three levels of recognition: bronze (7 out of 11), silver (8 out of 11), and gold (at least 9 out of 11).

- 1. Attends a chapter leadership training session
- 2. Growing or steady membership
- 3. Offers IMC or VMC Club programs
- 4. Participates in Young Eagle or Flying Start programs
- 5. Has EAA-approved Flight Advisor or Technical Counselor
- 6. Participates In EAA's Annual Chapter Member survey
- Participates in Young Eagles Build and Fly, Young Eagles Workshops, Ray Aviation Scholarship program, or sends a youth to EAA's Air Academy
- 8. Requests an EAA ChapterBlast email
- Hosts at least two public events each year
- 10. Owns/leases a facility
- Extra credit activity, such as a chapter build project, youth build project, chapter scholarship, a chapter tool orib, IAC competition, etc.

LAST MONTH'S PROGRAM



When a retired engineer with a sincere interest in WW-I claims he's not an expert on aviation presents a program about WW-I airplanes, well, you could have fooled us. Terry Collins volunteers with the WW-I Museum in Kansas City and provided an exceptionally clear and stimulating talk that put the topic in crystal clear perspective. As a kid fascinated with aviation, I'd often wondered about the differences in these ancient airplanes and how they did what they did. Using an illustrated timeline, and scale models, Terry explained the fascinating evolution of these aircraft through this epic time. His display even depicted the various altitude capabilities in the same scale. Neat!

The first aircraft in the war were balloons used for artillery observation. Parachutes were the preferred exit method when those rickety gas bags were shot and caught fire. Airplanes that existed prior to the war did not have specific missions since using them to fight had not been anticipated or explored. With this as a backdrop, Terry explained the various makes and models along with their strengths and weaknesses. He expounded on why so many early biplanes looked like bridges – something the designers knew how to build. He also explained the advancements in various firearms and artillery pieces which evolved quickly and by necessity. Illustrating the difficulties of mounting machine guns on the planes was alone worth the price of admission.

He then covered how the thinking changed to understand why designing a plane for a specific purpose became essential – something we don't even question today. But back then, a bomber was just any airplane where the pilot could hand drop small bombs. That wasn't very effective, but it did stimulate some new thoughts about mission and objective. So in addition to bombers, this brought about specific development for other purposes like fighters, attack, and pursuit planes.

Terry's program was so robust and full of information that we all agreed to have him back to explore even more related topics. For example, how the military learned about the correlation between oxygen and altitude. Obviously, Terry triggered some serious thoughts to learn more, and we look forward to his return.

THIS MONTH'S PROGRAM

The Kansas City area has some pretty nice airports. Like many of you, I can remember many fun flights to and from MKC when it was the area's primary commercial hub. Back then, I lived more than one hundred miles away and would frequently fly my trusty Stinson down to visit friends, pick-up a date, or take someone to catch a flight. And yes, I always had a shared purpose with my passengers to make those trips. It was exciting sharing airspace with the big boys, and being able to taxi to the terminal for a passenger pickup or drop off. We sure don't see that anymore, do we?

I can still recall that day in the 70s when I flew over the huge expanse of concrete that was to become Kansas City International. It was breathtaking. That was before it opened, of course, and to a young, newbie pilot, it was a bit intimidating. Fun? Yes. Exciting? Yes. But intimidating nonetheless.

If any of that brings back memories, you'll want to attend our May gathering because we're going to hear from Melissa Cooper, who managed MKC for years and is now fulfilling the same role at MCI. She will surely have a lot to say about both facilities but will be especially informative about MCI's major remodeling project and its future.
